Hadi, Bonjour and Hello,

Tomorrow is our 25th Annual Ultimate Frisbee Tournament. 25 years of dedication to spinal cord research is too much to summarize here. Please read the attached article by Mrs. Worthington to learn more. We will be welcoming intermediate students from schools all around our area for a day of play and awareness of the need to support spinal cord research. We invite you to come out and watch some games.

Monday is the 4th Annual Day for Truth and Reconciliation. We will honour this day in SDg1 on Friday – but this is not just about one day. It is about what we all do continually to acknowledge and learn from the past to create a new world where reconciliation is a reality. I encourage you to talk to your kids about what they have learned in school about the tragic residential school history, its continued impact and why we must recognize that EVERY CHILD MATTERS. # W. L. McLeod Elementary School Feeding Futures Hot Lunch Program




#### Hello McLeod family!

As you already know, the McLeod Farm to School PAC Program is now the SD91/BC Feeding Futures Program. We can't make this change without a HUGE thank you to the many adults who have worked tirelessly and selflessly for over a decade to create an incredible hot lunch program. We will forever be so proud of our home-grown success.

As part of the new Feeding Futures Program, we will now be using MunchaLunch.com for hot lunch ordering. You can pay for your orders online using a credit card (Visa/Mastercard), debit-credit card, Google Pay, Apple Pay or pre-paid credit card. The website will be ready to go for registration and ordering meals starting on Monday, September 23<sup>rd</sup> for meals starting on Wednesday, October 1<sup>st</sup>. We will still accept paper orders at the office, but we encourage everyone to use Munch-a-lunch as much as possible please.

#### **HOW TO REGISTER.**

- 1) Go to MunchaLunch
- 2) Click the "Register Here" button (as shown below). The system will guide you through.

- 4) Next time, just click the "Login Here" button to access your account.



Student Pick-up & Drop-off at W.L. McLeod Elementary









#### Phyllis (Jack) Webstad's story in her own words . . . .



I went to the Mission for one school year in 1973/1974. I had just turned 6 years old. I lived with my grandmother on the Dog Creek reserve. We never had very much money, but somehow my granny managed to buy me a new outfit to go to the Mission school. I remember going to Robinson's store and picking out a shiny orange shirt. It had string laced up in front, and was so bright and exciting – just like I felt to be going to school!

When I got to the Mission, they stripped me, and took away my clothes, including the orange shirt! I never wore it again. I didn't understand why they wouldn't give it back to me, it was mine! The color orange has always reminded me of that and how my feelings didn't matter, how no one cared and how I felt like I was worth nothing. All of us little children were crying and no one cared.

I was 13.8 years old and in grade 8 when my son Jeremy was born. Because my grandmother and mother both attended residential school for 10 years each, I never knew what a parent was supposed to be like. With the help of my aunt, Agness Jack, I was able to raise my son and have him know me as his mother.

I went to a treatment centre for healing when I was 27 and have been on this healing journey since then. I finally get it, that the feeling of worthlessness and insignificance, ingrained in me from my first day at the mission, affected the way I lived my life for many years. Even now, when I know nothing could be further than the truth, I still sometimes feel that I don't matter. Even with all the work I've done!

I am honored to be able to tell my story so that others may benefit and understand, and maybe other survivors will feel comfortable enough to share their stories.

#### Today ....

Phyllis Webstad is Northern Secwpemc (Shuswap) from the Stswecem'c Xgat'tem First Nation (Canoe Creek Indian Band). She comes from mixed Secwepemc and Irish/French heritage, was born in Dog Creek, and lives in Williams Lake, BC. Today, Phyllis is married, has one son, a stepson and five grandchildren. She is the Executive Director of the Orange Shirt Society, and tours the country telling her story and raising awareness about the impacts of the residential school system. She has now published two books, the "Orange Shirt Story" and "Phyllis's Orange Shirt" for younger children.

She earned diplomas in Business Administration from the Nicola Valley Institute of Technology; and in Accounting from Thompson Rivers University. Phyllis received the 2017 TRU Distinguished Alumni Award for her unprecedented impact on local, provincial, national, and international communities through the sharing of her orange shirt story.



#### ICORD Ultimate Tournament

School begins, fall is in the air and elementary schools in the Vanderhoof and surrounding area are gearing up for the annual Ultimate Frisbee tournament at W.L. McLeod Elementary School. All money raised is forwarded to ICORD, a research and development institution dedicated to finding an answer to cure spinal cord injuries.

In 1999 John Ryan, a paraplegic, married to Penny McLeod, the daughter of our school's namesake, decided to fight for a cause that was dear to his heart. John was injured in a vehicle accident a couple of years earlier and because he was not wearing his seat belt, he sustained a spinal cord injury. John decided to cycle across Canada hoping to raise money and awareness for spinal cord injuries. His tour, called the Regeneration Tour, ended in October 1999 and John came here to Vanderhoof to celebrate the successes of his trip.

It was in October of '99 that three staff members of W.L. McLeod Elementary School organized a "John Ryan Ultimate" tournament. The choice to play ultimate was an easy decision. Ultimate Frisbee is an organized wheelchair game and one that John participated in. He was excited to hear of our idea to help him in his efforts to find a cure for spinal cord injuries; first by hosting an event that would raise money for the cause and secondly by choosing a sport he enjoys. John and Penny with Bill and Judy McLeod also attended our fundraiser. It was successful and we decided to continue hosting the tournament the following year. One year followed the next and soon it became an annual fall event for the elementary schools in our community.

John, Penny, and their daughter Janel attended some of our tournament days, although living in Whistler was a long trip for them to make each year. Probably one of the most memorable tournaments was the year that John and Penny surprised everyone with the inclusion of their friend, Mr. Trevor Linden. It was a real treat for everyone in attendance. Our tournament has created some exciting moments for everyone involved!

That was twelve years ago and this year we are hosting our 25th Ultimate tournament. We have shortened the name to the Ultimate Frisbee tournament and all the money raised goes directly to ICORD. ICORD is the International Collaboration on Repair Discoveries, a research centre in the UBC Faculty of Medicine & VCH Research Institute.

Over the years we have seen thousands of students participating and have raised thousands of dollars. All the money raised has gone to research. A key to our successful fundraising during the tournaments must be credited to our local Co-op. Each year, without fail, they have supplied our concession needs. This donation of food has allowed for a 100% donation of money raised.

Leading up to our 10<sup>th</sup> tournament, in 2008, we worked with CI Radio, our local radio station, and held a telethon. This was another example of the support we enjoyed from the community. Again, thanks to the prizes contributed by our local businesses, we were able to donate 100% of the money generated from our afternoon on the air.

As we are a small community, we rely on our neighbours to support the kids and adults working behind the scenes. Our vision is that this is a day we come together in a positive and inclusive spirit to help researchers find answers they seek.

Our local newspaper, Omineca Express, has covered our events with write-ups and pictures from the various fields of play. Pictures say a thousand words about kids playing hard for the cause. Everyone wins! We always appreciate the buildup in the paper and then look for action shots in the week following.

In 2018 we played our 20<sup>th</sup> tournament and it was a big deal in our school and through the community. ICORD wanted to be here to celebrate in our achievement and were able to send two scientists. They were great representatives that shared some of their research stories with us, as well as participated in some of the games. Rick Hansen also became involved with our tournament that year. Rick was kind enough to record a message for all the participants to hear. He was proud and humbled by the efforts our community for all the years raising research dollars for ICORD and for raising awareness of the challenges for persons with spinal cord injuries.

We are the only charity still operating and raising money for John's dream of a cure for spinal cord injuries. We are proud of our efforts and even prouder of the community that supports this event. In the end, we will all have contributed to finding a cure. The students involved will know they were a part of the solution. Together, all of us will one day be able to say "Yes, I was a part of finding the answers for spinal cord injuries!"

This year, on Sept. 26th, our tournament will play out again. This will be our 25<sup>th</sup> tournament. ICORD is sending two students from their program to visit us during the games. They hope to help out with the games and maybe join the students on the fields. We have five local elementary schools participating on Thursday.

Please feel free to join us and cheer on all the kids playing on the grounds around W.L.McLeod School. Our concession is open to everyone!

Thank you to everyone that has been, and continues to be, a part of our efforts!
